Who can borrow seeds?

 Anyone that participates in the Yankton Seed Library's gardening classes can borrow seeds from the seed library.

What time is the library open?

• The seed library is open in conjunction with the Library's gardening classes.

What do you mean "borrow" seeds? How can I do that if I plant them?

Plant the seeds. Then, at the end of the season, if you feel comfortable, you can return seeds from the next generation of
plants. You can learn how by taking one of the library's free classes. Don't worry, there are no fines if you don't save seeds.

#### Garden Clean Up

Remove old tomatoes and potatoes that may have late blight and destroy them. Do not put into your compost unless you are experienced and sure your compost will hit 140 degrees



## For the birds

■ In your flower bed leave some of the seed heads for the birds. Cone flowers, black eye susan and sunflowers are favorites of birds.



## Winter interest

Leave some plants in your garden for winter interest. Make a four season garden that looks great all year. Tans are a color too.



### Winter Perennials

The plants will collect snow. The snow will help to insulate the crown of the plants and water the soil in the spring.



## Watering Systems

Drain and store hoses. Make sure they are not connected to your faucets Winter freezing could cause damage to your home.

Turn off and drain sprinkler systems



## Clean garden structures

- Remove all stakes, cages and trellis.
- Clean with a 10% bleach solution to guarantee you are not carrying over any problems



## Take care of your tools

- This is the time to clean, oil and sharpen your tools.
- You can use most kinds of oil will work; motor oil, vegetable oil, and the oil of the day coconut oil.
- Sharpen every tool that has an edge.
- Store in a bucket of oiled sand.



#### Testing soil and amend soil

- Test soil for pH
- Add compost pr manure
- Plant a cover crop. Winter rye should be planted four weeks before first frost. 50% of the time the first frost occurs in Yankton by October 5; 90% of the time by October 24.
- Rye is an excellent winter cover crop because it rapidly produces a ground cover that holds soil in place against the forces of wind and water. Rye's deep roots help prevent compaction in annually tilled fields, and because its roots are quite extensive, rye also has a positive effect on soil tilth.



#### Collect and save leaves

■ Save your fallen leaves.

Pick up with a mulching lawn mower. Only if yo have not used a herbicide to the lawn.

Leaf mold is an exceller source of nutrients for your garden.
